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FCONOMIC AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

October — December, 1974

INTRODUCTION

An attempt is made to present here the economic and financial developments in Mauritius during the last quarter of 1974. The performance of the economy during the year, which by comparison with earlier years was in many respects unusual, has also been touched upon. The regular statistical tables containing the detailed figures form a separate part of the Review.

Although national income data are not yet available, it is estimated that Gross National Product at current prices rose by about 70 per cent in 1974. This is a continuation of the boom years 1972 and 1973 when national income rose by 24 per cent and 30 per cent respectively. The rise in prices no doubt loomed large in the high rate of growth but the impressive performance of the sugar sector was also an important factor: sugar production in 1974 reached a level of 696,786 metric tons and sugar export receipts more than doubled between 1973 and 1974. Among other sectors, special mention must also be made of the performance of the Export Processing Zone, tourism and construction.

In the sphere of money and banking, money supply spiralled from Rs. 466.5 million in December, 1973, to Rs. 783.7 million in December, 1974, thereby recording a rise of 68 per cent over last year's level. This is largely attributable to the unforeseen rise in export receipts during the last quarter of the year. Credit* to the private sector also witnessed a record expansion during the year: the monthly average credit* to the private sector in 1974 at Rs. 610.3 million showed a rise of 42 per cent over the average of Rs. 429.7 million reached in 1973.

Aggregate deposits of the private sector reached a record level of Rs. 1,224.3 million at the end of December, 1974. The growth in time and savings deposits also was impressive: at the end of December, 1974, they totalled Rs. 755.5 million showing a rise of 100 per cent over the level of Rs. 375.9 million at the end of December, 1973.

The one discordant note in this exceptionally good year was the continuing high rate of inflation. Consumer prices recorded an average rise of 29.1 per cent in 1974 in contrast to a rise of 13.5 per cent in 1973. The rising trend, however, decelerated in the second half of the year.

The main developments in certain selected sectors are discussed in the following sections.

I. AGRICULTURE

Sugar

Sugar production in 1974, which was initially estimated at 675,000 metric tons and subsequently revised to 690,000 metric tons, actually reached 696,786 metric tons. This is the second highest production after the record of 718,464 metric tons attained in 1973. The drop in production was of the order of 3 per cent. Average sugar extraction reached a level of 11.69 per cent as compared to 11.51 per cent in 1973. Most of the improvement in production has come from higher cane yield per arpent.

Total exports in 1974 in respect of the year's entitlement reached the figure of 674,529 tons \(\) as against 686,603 tons for the 1973 entitlement. Exports were directed to various countries as shown in the table below:—

Sugar prices in 1974 soared to unprecedented levels, reaching in November a figure as high as £650 per ton on the London Terminal Market. The monthly average prices during the last quarter of the year were £396.96 for October, £566.66 for November and £459.47 for December. The annual average for 1974 works out to £304.72 as compared to only £99.32 for 1973. Thus the year 1974 turned out to be an exceptionally prosperous year for the sugar industry and hence for the economy as a whole, since sugar sets the tone for other economic activities by virtue of its predominance.

Tea

Production of tea during the fourth quarter of 1974 amounted to 1.3 million kilos and exports to 0.7 million kilos. During the corresponding period of 1973 production totalled 1.2 million kilos and exports 0.8 million kilos.

The year 1974 registered a somewhat lower level of production and exports than the previous year: while production at 4.0 million kilos compared with 4.1 million kilos a year ago exports were down from 3.5 million kilos in 1973 to 3.1 million kilos in 1974.

II. MONEY AND BANKING

As mentioned in the previous Review, money supply (defined to include currency held by the public and demand deposits of the banking sector) spiralled during the last quarter of 1974. It stood at Rs. 466.6 million at the end of September but jumped to Rs 783.7 million at the end of December, 1974, or a rise of 68 per cent. This compares with a rise of 20.4 per cent during the corresponding period of the previous year. This large expansion in money supply is mainly attributable to the substantial inflow of sugar export receipts in the last quarter of the year.

The growth in money supply between December, 1973, and December, 1974, was of the order of Rs 317.2 million, thus showing a dramatic rise of 68 per cent. The comparable rise as between December, 1973, and December, 1974, and September, 1974, and December, 1974, is explained by the fact that during the first nine months of 1974 the country ran a balance of payments deficit, offsetting any increases in money supply during that period making the December, 1973, and September, 1974, figures identical. Of the two components of money supply, the rate of expansion in demand deposits was more pronounced than that in currency with the public: demand deposits rose by 76.6 per cent while currency with the public rose by 56.6 per cent. The Table below shows the trends in money supply.

Commercial banks' credit to the private sector grew rather moderately during the last quarter of 1974: it rose from Rs 557.3 million at the end of September, 1974, to Rs 594.3 million at the end of December, 1974. The rise was thus of the order of only 6.6 per cent as

compared to a rise of 16.7 per cent during the corresponding quarter of 1973. This smaller increase was largely due to the growth of liquidity in the hands of the public. Taking the year 1974 as a whole, the monthly average level of credit at Rs 535.1 million recorded an increase of 25.4 per cent over the monthly average level of credit of Rs 426.6 million in 1973. On this basis it would appear that there has been a deceleration in the rate of expansion in credit. However, if the bills rediscounted with the Bank of Mauritius and amounting to Rs 75.2 million are taken into account, the expansion in commercial banks' credit to the private sector in 1974 would be of the order of 42 per cent as compared with 31 per cent in 1973, which was beyond the authorities' expectations. This had implication to the shape of monetary policy for 1975. The following table illustrates the trends in credit to the private sector:—

Credit extended by commercial banks to the public sector soared from Rs 98.2 million in September, 1974, to Rs 479.5 million in December, 1974. This very steep rise was largely accounted for by the increase in commercial banks' investments in Government securities and in Treasury Bills: these investments increased by Rs 247.6 million and by Rs 133.6 million respectively. The proportion of commercial banks' investments in Government securities and Treasury Bills to their deposits, which was 15 per cent in September, 1974, rose to 38.9 per cent in December, 1974.

These investments of the commercial banks were necessitated by the excess liquidity which accrued to the commercial banks from the substantial sugar export proceeds which flowed in towards the end of 1974 and also by the Bank's policy of restrained credit expansion.

Aggregate deposits of the private sector showed a phenomenal growth during the last quarter of 1974: they reached Rs 1,224.3 million at the end of December, 1974, from Rs 646.7 million at the end of September, 1974, or a rise of 89.3 per cent. The growth in time and savings deposits, which was rather sluggish during the first nine months of 1974, showed an impressive rise during the last quarter of the year. These deposits at Rs 755.5 million at the end of December, 1974, recorded a rise of just over 100 per cent above the level of Rs 375.9 million in December, 1973.

The main factors which have been responsible for the sharp rise in deposits with the commercial banks have been the unusually large export income realised from the record high sugar prices in the world market and the propensity to save extra income.

Capital and Money Markets

The following seven Development Loan Stocks were issued in December, 1974:

- (a) 6½% Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1981 for a sum of Rs 20 million
- (b) 7 % Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1987 for a sum of Rs 15 million
 (c) 7½% Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1993 for a sum of Rs 20 million

- 6½% Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1979 for a sum of Rs 20 million (d)
- 63% Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1984 for a sum of Rs 20 million (e)
- 7½% Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1989 for a sum of Rs 30 million (f)
- $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ Mauritius Development Loan Stock 1994 for a sum of Rs 35 million

The issue of these stocks not only enabled the target of Rs 55 million laid down in the Capital Budget for 1974-75 to be attained but also led to an expansion of the government's borrowing programme while it provided a suitable outlet to the commercial banks for the investment of their surplus funds.

During the fourth quarter of 1974, Treasury Bills issued on tap amounted to Rs 236.2 million, while Bills which were redeemed amounted to Rs 105.9 million. The amount of Bills outstanding at the end of December, 1974, was of the order of Rs 149.3 million as compared to Rs 19 million at the end of September, 1974.

III. THE PRICE SITUATION

The Consumer Price Index (whole Island) rose from 188.0 in September, 1974, to 193.6 in December, 1974, a rise of only 3 per cent. It seems that the rate at which prices have been

rising has declined substantially during the second half of 1974. In fact while the monthly average rise during the first half of 1974 was of the order of 24.6 per cent when compared with the monthly average for 1973, the corresponding rise during the second half over the average for the first half was only 7.2 per cent. The main impact of the increases in oil prices and prices of cereals was thus felt in the first half of 1974. Also, the financial measures taken by the Government tended to moderate the inflationary rise.

The monthly average of the indices for the twelve months of 1974 at 183.6 was higher by 29.1 per cent as compared to the corresponding average of 142.2 for 1973. This sharp rise of 29.1 per cent compares with rises of 13.5 per cent in 1973 and 5.4 per cent in 1972. It is indeed a disturbing development but Mauritius is not alone in experiencing rising prices. Since Mauritius depends heavily on imports, the rise in import prices has contributed to a large part of this increase. The index of import prices has risen by as much as 63 per cent in 1974 as compared to 30 per cent in 1973.

IV. GOVERNMENT FINANCE

Recurrent revenue during the first half of the financial year 1974-75 amounted to Rs 304.5 million and recurrent expenditure to Rs 343.1 million, as compared with Rs 221.3 million and Rs 229.3 million respectively for the corresponding period of the previous year. Thus, revenue showed an increase of 37.6 per cent and expenditure of 49.6 per cent over the previous year. The increase in revenue is accounted for by both direct and indirect taxes resulting from the buoyancy of the economy. The increase in expenditure is due mainly to higher disbursements on account of the subsidization of rice and wheat flour and on such items as Health, Public Debt, Education and Social Services.

In regard to the Capital Budget, revenue amounted to Rs 179.1 million and expenditure to Rs 105.1 million, thus yielding a surplus of Rs 73.6 million. The bulk of the capital revenue was accounted for by local loans, which amounted to Rs 160 million. It may be recalled that the original estimate provided for only Rs 55 million of local loans. Of the total expenditure of Rs 105.5 million, an amount of Rs 67.2 million was incurred on Plan projects: this represented only 33 per cent of the estimated expenditure on Plan projects of Rs 203.1 million for 1974-75.

V. EXTERNAL TRADE AND BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

(a) External Trade

As forecast in the previous Review, imports in 1974 almost doubled and reached the record level of Rs 1,756 million as compared to Rs 916 million in 1973. This is a disturbing trend indeed and may have serious repurcussions on the balance of payments in the coming years. Fortunately exports in 1974 performed very well largely because of the high sugar prices and amounted to Rs 1,786 million. This was the first time since 1966 that a trade surplus was generated. The surplus amounts to Rs 30 million as shown in the table below:—

(b) Balance of Payments — 1974

The final figures of the balance of payments for the first half of 1974 show a deficit as high as Rs 232 million as compared to a deficit of Rs 47 million during the first half of 1973. This figure is high but it must be stressed that because of the seasonality of exports the first half of the year usually generates a balance of payments deficit.

The substantial deficit recorded during the first half of 1974 was the result of the large deficit appearing in the trade account: the trade deficit amounted to Rs 380 million as against Rs 125 million during the corresponding period of the previous year. With the sharp increase in imports the services account deteriorated during the period under review: the deficit at Rs 20 million compares with a surplus of Rs 1 million recorded during the first half of 1973. These features are shown in table VIII.

Although the final balance of payments estimates for 1974 have yet to be completed, additional information which has become available indicates that the year generated an overall surplus of Rs 369 million. As mentioned in the previous Review, this record surplus is primarily the result of the boom in sugar export earnings. The following table summarizes the balance of payments for the years 1972 to 1974:—

CONCLUSION

Mauritius has had a period of rapid growth in the last four years which coincide with the first Four-year Development Plan. In 1974, it had an exceptionally good year when sugar exports reached a new high, partly reflecting the high sugar prices realised in the world market and there was a large balance of payments surplus of Rs 369 million. The level of foreign exchange reserves of the Bank of Mauritius reached a record level of Rs 749.8 million at the end of December, 1974 which was equivalent to five months of 1974 imports.

However, the country has been passing through a period of severe inflation resulting from high prices of imported goods and escalation of internal demand. The high economic growth rate and the sharp rise in wages and salaries have triggered demand pressures which pushed prices upward despite higher imports. In 1974, therefore, both fiscal policy and monetary policy had to be geared to moderating demand pressures. The deceleration of price rises in the second half of 1974 was a welcome break from the continuous increase recorded in 1973 and the first half of 1974. The maintainance of price stability and of a healthy balance of payments position continues to be the twin objectives of monetary and fiscal policy.
